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At-Risk Youth to Receive Free and Subsidized Registration in Museum Youth Programs

Shortino Foundation's \$25,000 Award Makes a Difference for Local Youth

San Jose, CA – May 3, 2018 – Local at-risk youth from low-income families will learn about video and digital media, experience the joys of community service, and make new friends in the museum's youth programs thanks to a \$25,000 grant from The Shortino Foundation. The funds will support free and subsidized registration for teens in three museum youth programs – <u>Summer of Service</u>, <u>Discovery</u> <u>Youth</u> and the Sacred Heart Nativity Schools Partnership, serving more than 300 youth annually.

"The continued support from The Shortino Foundation provides opportunities for our most vulnerable teens to learn life skills like teamwork, collaboration, and leadership, said Jenni Martin, director of strategic initiatives and education. "They also learn important practical skills in digital media and the rewards of volunteering – all while having fun and meeting new people. We're grateful for the foundation's support in helping us serve the entire community regardless of ability to pay."

Teens in grades seventh through tenth volunteer at local non-profits, learn life skills, facilitate hands-on activities for museum families, and digitally document their activities in the innovative *Summer of Service* program. Kids in grades sixth through tenth learn first-hand how to digitally produce stories including how to operate a video camera, interview, edit, and photograph in *Discovery Youth*, which is offered during the school year. During the academic year, kids from Sacred Heart Nativity Schools Partnership learn 21st century skills like digital literacy that culminates in a video and school presentation.
